NEW BREAKERS AT SEA.

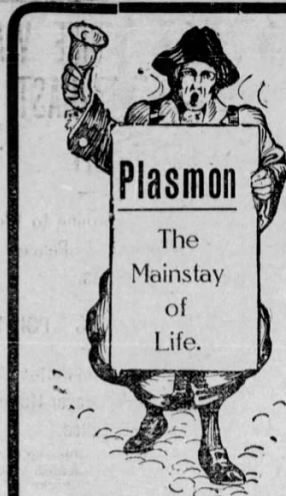
Chilean Earthquake Thought to Have Raised This Danger.

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—The British steamer Franklyn, Capt. Splatt, sixty-nine days from Norway and thirty-five days from Montevideo, has arrived with a cargo of thirty-five thousand casks of cement and six hundred tons of merchandise. Her master reports that on October 28, when six hundred miles southwest of the Galapagos Islands, off the South American coast, the vessel passed by what appeared to be heavy breakers, very dangerous to navigation. No such breakers are shown on the charts, and the belief exists that the recent heavy earthquake in Chile may have caused this new menace.

MARINE NOTES.

Items of Interest and Happenings on the Waterfront.

The steamer Indiana, last of the Nome fleet of 1906, reached Seattle on Sunday. She had a hundred and ninety-nine passengers from the North. Her passage down was unusually rough and occupied twelve days. To-day the steamer Princess May is taking the Victoria run for the round trip, while the Charmer lays off. The halibut-steamer Manhattan, Capt. Gott, will sail for the fishing banks early to-morrow morning. Steamer Cassiar arrived at 8:30 o'clock last night, being twelve hours late on account of the bad weather encountered. She will sail for Port Harvey and points en route at 4 o'clock this afternoon. The steamer Tottenham left Java with a cargo of six thousand tons of raw sugar for this port, consigned to the British Columbia Sugar Refining Company, on October 22.
